Catalog Description: Personal and Organizational Leadership – student gains personal and professional leadership skills, progressing from dependency on others to independence, and finally to interdependence with others in the organization.

Course Synopsis: This course is designed to provide participants with a working knowledge of the standards for leadership which have been designed by the Interstate School Leaders Licensure Consortium (ISLLC) and other resources.

The standards represent an effort to refine the skills of school leaders to effective educational outcomes.
