COURSE OUTCOMES AND COMPETENCIES:

The student will

- 1. Describe the spiritual significance and benefits to the Christian faith of devotional and/or contemplative spirituality, focused on the text examined for the term.
- Demonstrate an appreciation that Christianity is a way of life, not merely a set of beliefs or values, by the sharing of practical examples of the impact of devotional and/or contemplative reflection upon daily life.
- 3. Reflect on how the practices and concepts within the assigned text impact their lives in their daily decisions and relationships.

ATTENDANCE REQUIREMENTS:

- Attendance for online courses is defined fully in the university catalog.
- Students are expected to participate in all required instructional activities in their courses.
- Student "attendance" in an online course is defined as active participation in the course as described in the course syllabus (completing weekly assignments).

COURSE REQUIREMENTS and GRADING CRITERIA:

- 1. *Discussion Boards*. Students will read assigned materials and participate in discussion with classmates and professor each week.
- 2. Personal Journal. Students will keep a reflective journal in Blackboard discussing how the texts relate to the Christian life and personal experience. Journal entries will be for both class-assigned readings as well as students' selection of additional Lewis readings. See the Course Info section of Blackboard for additional information on assignment.

GRADING CRITERIA

1. University Grading Scale 2. Computation of Final Grade

Cr Credit a. Weekly Discussion: 50% NCr No Credit b. Journal Entries: 50%

The grade for this formation course is Credit/Non-credit. The grade for each individual assignment, however, will be based on the university grading scale. Timely work is essential. Students must complete the course with a minimum average of 70 for the assignments.

Grade Appeal Statement: Students shall have protection through orderly procedures against prejudices or capricious academic evaluation. A student who believes that he or she has not been held to realistic academic standards, just evaluation procedures, or appropriate grading, may appeal the final grade given in the course by using the student grade appeal process described in the Academic Catalog. Appeals may not be made for advanced placement examinations or course bypass examinations. Appeals are limited to the final course grade, which may be upheld, raised, or lowered at any stage of the appeal process. Any recommendation to lower a course grade must be submitted through the Vice President of Academic Affairs/Faculty Assembly Grade Appeals Committee for review and approval. The Faculty Assembly Grade Appeals Committee may instruct that the course grade be upheld, raised, or lowered to a more proper evaluation.
