New Testament (Koine) Greek, stressing vocabulary, conjugation, declension, parsing, and translation.

COURSE OUTCOMES AND COMPETENCIES:

Students will –

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge of the basic elements of Greek grammar:
 - a. the alphabet and parts of speech of the Greek language
 - b. The forms of the Greek verb in the Present, Imperfect, Future, and Aorist Tenses.
 - c. The forms and functions of Greek nouns in the first and second declension.
 - d. The forms and functions of the personal and demonstrative pronouns.
 - e. The proper prepositions of the Greek language.
- 2. Demonstrate a working knowledge of the basic vocabulary of the Greek New Testament.
- 3. Demonstrate ability to translate into English Greek sentences and selected verses from the Greek New Testament.
