Research in the epistles of Hebrews, James, Peter, John, Jude, and the book of Revelation with particular attention to their historical settings, with an emphasis on questions concerning the literary genre of each writing.

COURSE OUTCOMES AND COMPETENCIES:

Students will -

- 1. Demonstrate understanding of the main teachings of the General Epistles and the Book of Revelation in light of their original contexts, and how to apply those teachings to the lives of believers and unbelievers living in the twenty-first century.
- 2. Demonstrate understanding of some of the textual and interpretive problems involved in understanding and applying the General Epistles and Revelation to today.
- Demonstrate understanding of the traditional methods for interpreting the Book of Revelation as a whole, and more specifically the traditional views of the millennial kingdom of Christ.
- 4. <u>Demonstrate competency in conducting graduate level research, writing, and/or oral presentations/argumentation in the field of New Testament Studies.</u>

COURSE REQUIREMENTS and GRADING CRITERIA:

Class Participation

Weighting: 10% Possible Points: 100

Due to the scope of material to be covered in this course, learners are expected to attend and participate throughout the semester. Participation points are not guaranteed. To gain points, learners must engage in the instructional activities of the course.

Article Reviews

Weighting: 20% (5% per review) Possible Points: 200 (50 points per review)

A total of 4 article reviews will be submitted for selective readings throughout the session. Each review should be about 2 pages and follow Turabian style. Article reviews should divide in 2 sections: about ¾ summary and ¼ evaluation of content. Reviews must be completed by the date listed in the course schedule or a late penalty (1/3 of a letter grade) per late day. Students will initiate a Discussion Board Question for each review to be engaged by the class.

Reading Quizzes

Weighting: 20% (4% per quiz) Possible Points: 200 (40 points per quiz)

A total of 5 reading quizzes will be taken at specific dates throughout the semester. Each quiz will cover specific content from the required readings for the course. Students will have the opportunity to take quizzes without time constraints and are permitted to utilize their Bible when answering questions. Quizzes must be completed by the date listed in the course schedule or a late penalty (1/3 of a letter grade) will be assessed for every day that expires beyond the original due date.

Research Paper

Weighting: 20% Possible Points: 200

Students will write an exegetical paper between 12-15 pages of text, excluding cover page, table of contents, appendices, and bibliography. The paper must follow the guidelines stipulated in the WBU School of Christian Studies' Style Guide. <u>The paper will reflect graduate level research and composition</u>.

<u>Exams</u>

Weighting: 30% (10% per exam) Possible Points: 300 (100 per exam)

Students will be required to take three exams for the course. These exams will focus on material covered in the class lectures and reinforced in the required reading.
