Course Outcome Competencies: Upon completion of this course, students will be able to understand and describe:

- Causes, process, and results of the exploration and settlement of the American colonies
- Causes, course, and results of the American revolutionary period
- Political, social, and economic events of the early national period
- Political, social, and economic transformation during the Jacksonian era
- Causes, course, and results of slavery and the era of sectional conflict
- Events and significant persons in the lives of ethnic minority and female Americans

Attendance Requirements:

WBUonline (Virtual Campus)

Students are expected to participate in all required instructional activities in their courses. Online courses are no different in this regard; however, participation must be defined in a different manner. Student "attendance" in an online course is defined as active participation in the course as described in the course syllabus. Instructors in online courses are responsible for providing students with clear instructions for how they are required to participate in the course. Additionally, instructors are responsible for incorporating specific instructional activities within their course and will, at a minimum, have weekly mechanisms for documenting student participation. These mechanisms may include, but are not limited to, participating in a weekly discussion board, submitting/completing assignments in Blackboard, or communicating with the instructor. Students aware of necessary absences must inform the professor with as much advance notice as possible in order to make appropriate arrangements. Any student absent 25 percent or more of the online course, i.e., non-participatory during 3 or more weeks of an 11-week term, may receive an F for that course. Instructors may also file a Report of Unsatisfactory Progress for students with excessive non-participation. Any student who has not actively participated in an online class prior to the census date for any given term is considered a "no-show" and will be administratively withdrawn from the class without record. To be counted as actively participating, it is not sufficient to log in and view the course. The student must be submitting work as described in the course syllabus. Additional attendance and participation policies for each course, as defined by the instructor in the course syllabus, are considered a part of the university's attendance policy.

Course Requirements:

Exams – Five (5) @ 30 points each. Each timed Exam will have 30 multiple choice questions, worth 1 point each, covering chapters from the assigned textbook. For more information, please see the FAQ sheet in the Blackboard course site and the Course Schedule on the syllabus.

Discussion Boards – Five (5) @ 25 points each. Discussion Boards in this class will require an Initial Post from each student (worth approximately 15 points) and Response Posts to at least two (2) different students (worth approximately 10 points). Late posts/responses will result in a deduction of points.

Response Journals – Five (5) @ 20 points each. Based on videos, primary documents, and/or lectures from the instructor, Response Journals are geared towards reader response. The goal of each journal is to see how the reader interacts with more focused snippets of history. Students should respond to journal questions in their own words, keeping in mind that this exercise is about seeing students engage with the material.

Book or Movie Review – One (1) @ 50 points. The Book/Movie Review is an alternative way to learn about history by comparing the perception of popular culture with the evidence of historical events. Students will need to select either a book or a movie from the "Book/Movie Review List" posted in Blackboard, read/watch their selection, and then answer the assigned questions.

Chapter Reading Quizzes – Fifteen (15) quizzes @ 5 points each. Chapter Quizzes will be available each week for each chapter covered. Students may attempt each Chapter Quiz twice, dropping their lowest score.

Extra Credit Opportunities:

Reflective Journal – Students will have the option at the end of the term to provide feedback about the course setup, design, content, etc. This is in addition to the Course Evaluation requested by Wayland.

Note: The instructor must be notified <u>in advance</u> of any request to submit late assignments and reserves the right to award partial credit for late submissions. As a general rule, late coursework is not accepted.

The University has a standard grade scale:

A = 90-100, B = 80-89, C = 70-79, D = 60-69, F= below 60, W = Withdrawal, WP = withdrew passing, WF = withdrew failing, I = incomplete. An incomplete may be given within the last two weeks of a long term or within the last two days of a microterm to a student who is passing, but has not completed a term paper, examination, or other required work for reasons beyond the student's control. A grade of "incomplete" is changed if the work required is completed prior to the last day of the next long (10 to 15 weeks) term, unless the instructor designates an earlier date for completion. If the work is not completed by the appropriate date, the I is converted to an F.

For this class, the grade scale breaks down as follows: A = 450-500, B = 400-449, C = 350-399, D = 300-349, F = 299-below.

Student Grade Appeals:

Students shall have protection through orderly procedures against prejudices or capricious academic evaluation. A student who believes that he or she has not been held to realistic academic standards, just evaluation procedures, or appropriate grading, may appeal the <u>final</u> grade given in the course by using the student grade appeal process described in the Academic Catalog. Appeals may not be made for advanced placement examinations or course bypass examinations. Appeals limited to the final course grade, which may be upheld, raised, or lowered at any stage of the appeal process. Any recommendation to lower a course grade must be submitted through the Vice President of Academic Affairs to the Faculty Assembly Grade Appeals Committee for review and approval. The Faculty Assembly Grade Appeals Committee may instruct that the course grade be upheld, raised, or lowered to a more proper evaluation.
