**Catalog Description:** A study of various techniques used by the historian with emphasis on the methods of historical inquiry and composition. ## **Attendance Requirements:**

## WBUonline (Virtual Campus)

Students are expected to participate in all required instructional activities in their courses. Online courses are no different in this regard; however, participation must be defined in a different manner. Student "attendance" in an online course is defined as active participation in the course as described in the course syllabus. Instructors in online courses are responsible for providing students with clear instructions for how they are required to participate in the course. To be counted as actively participating, it is not sufficient to log in and view the course. The student must be submitting work as described in the course syllabus. Additional attendance and participation policies for each course, as defined by the instructor in the course syllabus, are considered a part of the university's attendance policy.

## 1000 Point Grade Scale:

- <u>Grade Note:</u> This course operates using a 1000-point scale. At any given time during the semester, students have the ability to calculate their current standing in the class. This is the student's responsibility and the instructor will not complete these calculations for the student. To do this, simply add the number of points earned and divide that number by the total number of points that have been attempted to that point. Finally, multiply that number by 100 in order to see the current grade. In other words, if a student has earned 200 points through the Dissecting a Research Paper (worth 50 points), Finding Sources (worth 100 points), and Finding a Career (worth 100 points), they would use the following calculations to find their grade:
  - **200 / 250 = .8**
  - .8 x 100 = 80
  - The student currently has a B- average.
  - Please note that the instructor does not round up at the end of the semester.

## **Assignment Descriptions:**

- Understanding Sources Students will be required to complete two assignments in this category. First, students will be required to find a variety of types of sources and explain how each source fits into the primary, secondary, and tertiary category. Students will then write a brief reflection paper which reflects on the various types, uses, and locations of primary sources.
- ➤ Being a Historian Students will be required to complete a variety of assignments in this category. These assignments will provide students with the skills necessary to be a historian and introduce students to the writing and thinking skills required to succeed with a liberal arts degree. Each assignment's instructions will be provided separately on Blackboard to students.
- Class Project Students will be required to complete the class project building a historical project. Students will use the skills acquired throughout the semester to complete the class project.

Finding a Career – Students will read a pamphlet on "Careers in History" and then research career paths, plan the path, and present their findings to the colleagues.

# The University has a standard grade scale:

A = 90-100, B = 80-89, C = 70-79, D = 60-69, F= below 60, W = Withdrawal, WP = withdrew passing, WF = withdrew failing, I = incomplete. An incomplete may be given within the last two weeks of a long term or within the last two days of a microterm to a student who is passing, but has not completed a term paper, examination, or other required work for reasons beyond the student's control. A grade of "incomplete" is changed if the work required is completed prior to the last day of the next long (10 to 15 weeks) term, unless the instructor designates an earlier date for completion. If the work is not completed by the appropriate date, the I is converted to an F.

- All writing submissions must be submitted as Word Documents and all submissions must also meet the following requirements (Also available on Blackboard):
  - 1-inch margins
  - Times New Romans or Calibri 12-point font.
  - All paragraphs must be indented
  - Double-Spaced except citations and bibliographic citations are single spaced within/double-spaced between.
  - No extra space between paragraphs
  - No Title page (unless specifically required by the instructor)
  - Use the Header Function to provide the date and name
    - Example: Date Assignment Name
  - All formal writing submissions must have a title
    - For book reviews, the full book citation is to be used as the title.
    - Final projects may have creative titles
  - Must have page numbers centered and at the bottom. No page numbers on the first page.
    - Page number requirements in assignments DO NOT count bibliography pages.
- All writing submissions must be submitted in Turabian citations, have footnotes, and a bibliography.
  - See <u>Turabian Citation Guide</u> or use the recommended Turabian manual listed in the recommended reading sections.
  - ONLY FOOTNOTES ARE ALLOWED DO NOT USE IN-TEXT CITATIONS OR ENDNOTES (UNLESS EXPLICITLY ALLOWED BY INSTRUCTOR)
- > Students only get **ONE** redo on free formatting. After that students will receive a letter grade equivalent point deduction for not following citation and formatting guidelines. For each time

formatting guidelines are not met the point deduction grows a letter grade. For example, the second (after the one free) infraction will result in points equivalent to two letter grades.
