Course Outcome Competencies:

At the end of the course, the student will possess:

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge of the basic elements of Greek grammar:
 - a. the alphabet and parts of speech of the Greek language
 - b. the forms of the Greek verb in the Present, Imperfect, Future, and Aorist Tenses.
 - c. the forms and functions of Greek nouns in the first and second declension.
 - d. the forms and functions of the personal and demonstrative pronouns.
 - e. the proper prepositions of the Greek language.
- 2. Demonstrate a working knowledge of the basic vocabulary of the Greek New Testament.
- 3. Demonstrate ability to translate into English Greek sentences and selected verses from the Greek New Testament.

Course Methodology:

The course is comprised of both face-to-face (or online) sessions and weekly online requirements. The course is a Flipped-Hybrid/Flipped-Hyflex course in which video lectures are viewed online/digital format prior to the classroom session. During the classroom period students will attend in person or via streaming and will work with the Professor through and in review of the Workbook assignments that accompany the chapter videos. This methodology allows us to increase our exposure to the Greek text of the New Testament during the week and together complete practical applications of our learning with real-time assistance from Faculty. I have taught Elementary Greek for more than 20 years and know that you will develop useful skills that will lead you deeper into both the Greek New Testament and the Septuagint.

This course is designed to assist the biblical studies student

- 1. To develop a reading knowledge of biblical Greek as a basis for reading the Greek New Testament with insight and understanding.
- 2. To develop skill in translating the text of the Greek New Testament for the purpose of Bible study and sermon preparation.

I will assist you in mastering the skills you need to succeed. Remember, Koine Greek is a language like any other. Therefore, you will need to invest significant time and effort in learning vocabulary and grammar. It is challenging, but you are more than capable of exceling! I will enjoy working with you as you conquer this challenge.

Students' Responsibilities:

- Prompt and regular class attendance and discussion participation.
- Careful attendance to the video lectures by the textbook/workbook author.
- Mastery and completion of each assignment in the *Workbook*.
- Vocabulary and grammar review is **required daily**. You will build a basic Greek vocabulary of 227 common Greek words, 73.49% of the Greek New Testament.
- Six scheduled guizzes.
- One Final translation exam.

Procedure for computations of final grade:

The final course grades will be derived from a combination of the three exams and 6 quizzes as follows:
