- Demonstrate knowledge of some of the critical methods used in New Testament studies.

- Demonstrate an understanding of the basic content of the New Testament and its main teachings (theological content).
- Demonstrate knowledge of the canonical process producing a more complete understanding of the New Testament.

7. When a student reaches a number of absences considered by the instructor to be excessive, the instructor will submit a Report of Unsatisfactory Progress to the student's WBU student email account and to appropriate university personnel.

Course Requirements and Grading Criteria:

- Weekly Reading quiz corresponding to the reading from the *Encountering the New Testament* textbook 6 quizzes. Lowest quiz grade will be dropped.
- **Unit exams:** Three exams to be given during the session as listed in the course outline.
- **Participation:** Students are expected to participate in online learning each week. A participation assignment will be posted each week with each assignment worth one point toward the total. Participation assignments vary from discussion of biblical passages to explanations of reading taken from the Bible or textbook. Each week counts as one point toward the participation grade of 20%.
