A study of the language of the Greek New Testament with attention to vocabulary, intermediate grammar, and syntax through the reading of selected New Testament texts.

COURSE OUTCOMES AND COMPETENCIES:

Students will -

- 1. Demonstrate an ability to translate from the Greek New Testament.
- 2. Demonstrate an ability to parse all verbs, participles, and infinitives.
- 3. Demonstrate knowledge of some of the more advanced elements of Greek Grammar:
 - a. Knowledge of syntactical categories for the Greek nouns in the eight cases.
 - b. Ability to translate the nouns in their appropriately in light of knowledge of the syntactical categories.

A grade of "CR" indicates that credit in semester hours was granted but no grade or grade points were recorded.
