CATALOG DESCRIPTION: study of the fundamentals of musical performance; attention directed toward building a basic repertoire for the beginning performer; course does not satisfy applied music requirements for music degrees unless approved by faculty.

ATTENDANCE REQUIREMENTS:

Class attendance is Mandatory. In case of illness or other need for absence, you must clear the absence with the instructor prior to the missed lesson AND if you are assigned an accompanist, you must provide notice to your accompanist prior to the missed lesson. Failure to do so will result in lowering your final grade by 10 percentage points for the first offense, 20 percentage points for the second offense, and a failing final grade (F) for the third offense.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION:

- 1. Weekly lessons will be scheduled by the instructor.
- 2. Make-up lessons are at the discretion and availability of the instructor.
- 3. Students will arrive at the lesson on time, with music and materials ready, well prepared, warmed-up, and ready to begin.
- 4. Students are expected to attend assigned masterclasses or performance labs as indicated by the applied faculty

- 5. Students are required to attend all faculty recitals in their performance area and are highly encouraged to attend all student recitals in their area.
- 6. Students are expected to complete any outside work (including individual practice) assigned by applied faculty.
- 7. Students are required to bring a recording device to each lesson.
- 8. Students are required to bring an assignment notebook and pencil to each lesson. Students should write down weekly assignments in this notebook and mark corrections directly into their musical score during each lesson.
- 9. A jury performance is required during the specified time at the end of the semester unless otherwise specified by applied faculty.
- 10. Any student wishing to advance in applied study beyond MUSI 1108 Applied Lessons (non-majors) should notify applied faculty for discussion and review of standing within the applied lesson curriculum.
