COURSE OUTLINE:

The course is designed to provide people interested in a career in higher education a grounding in the development of higher education in the U.S. The overarching concern of the course is help students understand how the development of higher education and the finance affects and is a part of 21st century colleges and universities.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

A. Written Assignments

Research paper is to develop an in depth understanding of a specific topic of interest that is related to the course learning outcomes and approved by the professor. The student is to write a 10-12 page paper on some aspect of the history of higher education in the United States that related to one or more of the course learning outcomes. The criteria for evaluating the paper will include (a) evidence that you conducted a careful search of current literature and older literature that is recognized as essential to the topic, (b) demonstration of reflective analysis of the literature and your topic, (c) well developed arguments for your conclusions, and (d) quality of your overall writing ability and adherence to APA formatting requirements.

B. Reading Assignments / Discussion Board - participation in the weekly discussion board postings is expected. Students are to be prepared to demonstrate understanding and mastery of the topic covered.

Your <u>first post</u> must be made not later the <u>THURSDAY at midnight</u> for each week's discussion. Final graded comments must be made not later than Sunday at midnight. Please be diligent about responding to all discussion board presentations, including those of fellow classmates.

C. Leading a weekly Discussion Board

Each student will assume responsibility for leading a weekly discussion board based on the specific reading assignment from either Thelin or Rudolph.

Please send an email to the instructor indicating the week you would like to lead not later **than <u>FRIDAY</u>**, **FEBRUARY 28TH at midnight**</u>. You may choose from Weeks 3 - 8 (see pages 4-5 of this syllabus). If I do not receive your email, I will select your discussion week. If two people select the same week, the one who emailed me first will be assigned that week.

For the week you lead discussion, you should include a brief summary of what you considered to be the most important ideas, concepts or practices addressed in the chapter and why you considered them to be useful. You should solicit class discussion concerning your ideas and what aspects of the reading were most useful to other class members. Additionally, you should facilitate class discussion with questions that engage class members in discussion of the issues and implications of material presented in your assigned chapters. You will need to find ways to engage class members in discussing the issues, unanswered questions, and implications of the reading assignment.

Your discussion board presentation will be evaluated on two criteria [a] the quality of the brief summary in analyzing the material and relating it to one's own experiences or observations and [b] the quality of the questions and relevance of the discussion to the course learning outcomes and content. Quality is characterized as the leader's ability to draw out unstated implications in the reading and engage class members in identifying and understanding multiple aspects of the assigned material

D. Examinations.

Two examinations will be administered during the course. The first examination will focus on the historical development of higher education and the implications history has on the current design and trends in higher education. The second examination will be over the financing of higher education and higher education in the late 20th century to the present.
