Catalog Description: Readings from imaginative literature; the research paper and shorter critical and interpretive essays.

Course Outcome Competencies: Upon the conclusion of this course, students actively engaged in learning will be able to:

- 1. Comprehend the importance of imaginative literature as it relates to other disciplines, the University's liberal arts mission, and the world at large.
- 2. Discuss three major literary genres: short fiction, poetry, and drama.
- 3. Identify and analyze basic elements of literature.
- 4. Use and refine reading, research, and writing skills to support a clear point of view in regard to a piece of literature.
- 5. Demonstrate the ability to read critically and communicate persuasively.

The more the student puts into the course, the higher his or her outcome competencies will be.

Attendance Requirements: As stated in the Wayland Catalog, students enrolled at one of the University's external campuses should make every effort to attend all class meetings. All absences must be explained to the instructor, who will then determine whether the omitted work may be made up. When a student reaches that number of absences considered by the instructor to be excessive, the instructor will so advise the student and file an unsatisfactory progress report with the campus executive director. Because this course meets online and asynchronously, your attendance is based upon the timely completion of routine weekly assignments like discussion boards and reading quizzes. Each student is expected to be actively engaged in the online classroom multiple times a week. - 1. Reading Quizzes (20%): There will be a short, multiple-choice quiz each week over the assigned readings.
- 2. <u>Discussion Boards (30%)</u>: Each week you will be responsible for responding to a discussion board prompt about one or more of your assigned readings. You will also be required to respond to classmates' posts each week.
- 3. <u>Unit Exams (30%)</u>: There will be an exam at the end of each of our three course units. Each exam is worth 10% of your final grade. (No proctors required.)
- 4. <u>Research Paper (20%)</u>: You will complete a major research paper over a piece of literature of your choice from this course.

Late-Work Policy: **All assignments are due by 11:59 p.m. (Central Time) on the dates specified on Blackboard. Please plan to accordingly.** Any assignment that is not submitted by the given due date and time will be deducted 10 points for every 24-hour period that it is late, including holidays and weekends. Assignments turned in less than 24-hours late will only be deducted 5 points. No assignments will be accepted more than 5 calendar days late. (Example: An assignment due on May 14 at 11:59 p.m. will not be accepted after 11:59 p.m. on May 19.)

In the case of technical difficulties, email me immediately (*before the deadline*). If technical difficulties occur when attempting to submit an essay, please also attach a copy of the essay to your email to me. You will still be required to re-submit the essay on Blackboard with 24-hours of the technical difficulties being resolved to avoid late penalties. Only assignments submitted through Blackboard will be accepted for credit.
