**Course Outcome Competencies**: Upon the conclusion of this course, students actively engaged in learning will be able to:

- 1. Understand the principles of generative grammar from the perspective of grammatical rules
- 2. Identify the parts of speech and know the difference between open and closed lexical classes
- 3. Know phase structure rules for NPs, AdjPs, AdvPs, PPs, VPs, and clauses
- 4. Be able to draw trees to accurately reflect the constituency of the syntactic components
- 5. Understand binding theory and constraints on movement in syntax
- 6. Analyze syntactic data from various languages, namely English

The more the student puts into the course, the higher his or her outcome competencies will be.

Attendance Requirements: As stated in the Wayland Catalog, students enrolled at one of the University's external campuses should make every effort to attend all class meetings. I will note the submission time of the email in order to assess removing late penalties. You will be required to re-submit the assignment within 24 hours, or once the technical problem is resolved.

# Expectations, Communication, & Other Information:

While the nature of an online course allows students to work at their own pace, you are expected to keep up with the course materials weekly. *Please note: this is not a self-paced course*. This means that you should keep up with the readings and discussions posted each week and are responsible for turning in any assignments by the posted due date. Students who get behind in the weekly requirements will likely not do well in the course. Remember, also, that your attendance for the course is measured by your participation in the weekly discussions. Announcements and important information will be posted on the Blackboard site. Be sure to check the site often. Additional information may be sent to your WBU emails, so make sure you've set up a WBU email and are checking it often. Always feel free to email me or chat online anytime I'm signed on if you are concerned about the course or your progress. I am available to help you, provide resources, and give direction—but I cannot help you if I do not know you're struggling.

# **Course Requirements and Grading Criteria:**

*Participation: (15%).* Students will be responsible for the reading prior to the assigned HW material. Your participation grade will also come from your responses to discussion posts in the discussion forum.

*Homework Assignments (50%):* Students will complete 9 HW assignments over the readings. These HWs will include problem sets or require critical thinking and discussion over the chapter. Each HW is worth a little over 5%.

*Article Critique: (20%).* Students will be required to write a summary and response to an article on a topic related to syntax. More information about the critiques will be posted in Blackboard.

*Final exam (15%).* The final exam will include questions over the readings and HWs and ask you to write an essay response based on your own opinion and critical thinking over various discussions in the course.
