Course Outcome Competencies: Students will:

1. Identify the significant contributions of major theologians and movements to the history of Christian thought.
2. Discuss the key issues involved in major theological debates and schools of thought.
3. Demonstrate an understanding of the impact of history and culture upon the development of Christian doctrines.
4. Analyze and explain the importance of the councils, creeds, and confessions in the formation of Christian doctrines.
5. Identify and analyze important people and movements and their impact within the history of Christianity.

Attendance Requirements: Online Attendance Policy

Online Students: Students are expected to participate in all required instructional activities in their courses. Online courses are no different in this regard; however, participation must be defined in a different manner. Student “attendance” in an online course is defined as active participation in the course as described in the course syllabus. Instructors in online courses are responsible for providing students with clear instructions for how they are required to participate in the course. Additionally, instructors are responsible for incorporating specific instructional activities within their course and will, at a minimum, have weekly mechanisms for documenting student participation. These mechanisms may include, but are not limited to, participating in a weekly discussion board, submitting/completing assignments in Blackboard, or communicating with the instructor. Students aware of necessary absences must inform the professor with as much advance notice as possible in order to make appropriate arrangements. Any student absent 25 percent or more of the online course, i.e., non-participatory during 2 or more weeks of an 8 week term, may receive an F for that course. Instructors may also file a Report of Unsatisfactory Progress for students with excessive non-participation. Any student who has not actively participated in an online class prior to the census date for any given term is considered a “no-show” and will be administratively withdrawn from the class without record. To be counted as actively participating, it is not sufficient to log in and view the course. The student must be submitting work as described in the course syllabus. Additional attendance and participation policies for each course, as defined by the instructor in the course syllabus, are considered a part of the university’s attendance policy.

AI can be used in the research paper assignment for gathering resources for your research, producing your bibliography, assistance in formatting the paper, and providing ideas for your paper. Grammar checking and spell-checking software can be used to assist in making corrections to your paper and are not considered AI. AI cannot be used to write your paper. Other than grammar and spell-checking the use of AI needs to be documented in your bibliography as a source.

Course Requirements and Grading Criteria:

1. Each student will read the assigned readings and participate in the classroom experience.
2. Each student will take a midterm and a final exam. Material will come from the assigned readings and class notes.
3. Each student will write a research paper on an important church council, theological movement, or theologian's development of, or reaction to a significant doctrine in the history of Christianity. The paper needs to follow the Turabian format by using the WBU Religion Writing Lab Style Guide in form and documentation and use footnotes in the paper. The style guide and the cover page template are in the research paper folder in the Course Info/Syllabus folder. The paper needs to include a title page, and a bibliography in addition to the 8-10 pages of text and requires a minimum of ten sources. Margins for the paper need to be one inch, use 10 or 12 New Times Roman font, and double space. The professor will grade the paper according to the rubric posted on Blackboard. The student needs to submit the finished paper to the professor through email and safe assignment. The best way to do this in order to keep the formatting correct is to make separate word documents (one for the title page; 1 for the body of the paper, and 1 for the bibliography) and attach them to an email that you send to the professor. The body of the paper needs to be submitted through Safe Assignment in Blackboard.
4. Each student will read the lecture notes on Blackboard and submit postings to the Discussion Board forums on the assigned weeks. The student posting needs to be a minimum of 200 words. Students need to read all other student postings and make a student response to at least one other student posting. The student response needs to be a minimum of 175 words. There will be one grade for each discussion board forum which includes both the student posting and student response.
5. Each student will write a 3 to 5-page critical book review on *The Mosaic of Christian Belief*. The book review needs to have a title page, an analysis and evaluation of the book's contents highlighting the strengths and weaknesses of the book. Quotations from the book in the review can be referenced parenthetically with just the page number. The student can use book reviews from journal articles to

assist in the analysis and evaluation of the book as long as they are properly documented and footnoted and then included in a bibliography page.

6. Each student will prepare and submit a Power Point presentation on an assigned chapter out of *The Mosaic of Christian Belief*. The presentation needs to highlight the key points made in the assigned chapter.

Resources:

The student can request many resources through the WBU main campus library and have them mailed directly to his/her home. The Bible does not count as one of your minimum resources, however, when referencing the Bible see the writing style guide in how to footnote it, when referencing a study note from the *NIV Study Bible* use the form for one general editor. **START YOUR RESEARCH EARLY!**
