## COURSE OUTCOMES AND COMPETENCIES:

Students will -

1. Students will demonstrate knowledge of major doctrinal positions, including identification of relevant biblical passages, important theologians, and key theological terms.
2. Students will articulate clearly their own personal beliefs in relation to historic Christian doctrines.
3. Students will identify meaningful ways to relate theology to the ministry of the church.

## COURSE REQUIREMENTS and GRADING CRITERIA:

## Class Attendance/Participation

Weighting: 10\%
Possible Points: 100
Due to the scope of material to be covered in this course, learners are expected to attend and participate throughout the semester. Participation points are not guaranteed. To gain points, learners must engage in the instructional activities of the course. Since facilitating the learning experience is partially dependent on peer interaction, absence from activities will result in the loss of participation points. It is important to note that not all assignments are weighted equally with regard to possible participation points to be gained.

## Reading Quizzes

## Weighting: 30\% (5\% per report) Possible Points: $\mathbf{3 0 0}$ (50 points per report)

A total of 6 reading quizzes will be taken at specific dates throughout the semester. Each quiz will cover specific content from the required readings for the course. Students will have the opportunity to take quizzes without time constraints and are permitted to utilize their text books.

## Exams

## Weighting: 30\% (15\% per exam) Possible Points: 300 ( 150 per exam)

Students will be required to take two exams for the course. These exams will focus on material covered in the class lectures and reinforced in the required reading. A study guide will be provided to aid in preparation for each exam.

## Research Paper

## Weighting: 30\% Possible Points: 300

Students will be required to follow the guidelines of the School of Religion and Philosophy of Wayland Baptist University. Undergraduates will write a paper between 8-10 pages of text excluding cover page, table of contents, appendices, and bibliography. The paper is to follow the guidelines stipulated in the Wayland Baptist University School of Religion and Philosophy Style Guide. The paper will be double-spaced using 12 point TNR font. The topic of the paper may be chosen from any aspect of any of Latter Prophets. The professor will work with the student in selecting and refining the topic.

Grade Appeal Statement: "Students shall have protection through orderly procedures against prejudices or capricious academic evaluation. A student who believes that he or she has not been held to realistic academic standards, just evaluation procedures, or appropriate grading, may appeal the final grade given in the course by using the student grade appeal process described in the Academic Catalog.
