# **COURSE OUTCOME COMPETENCIES:**

The student will be able to:

- A. Describe the theatre process and compose a functional definition for the theatre event.
- B. Name the basic responsibilities and roles of the playwright, director, actor and designer in the theatre production.
- C. Have a basic understanding of the difference between tragedy, comedy, melodrama, farce, epic and absurdist theatre.
- D. Describe the uniqueness of the theatre art.
- E. Describe the elements necessary to bring about a unified production.
- F. List and describe several types of theatre language.
- G. Identify a variety of theatre spaces.
- H. Identify the names and works associated with key figures in the theatre.
- I. Demonstrate their understanding of either acting, directing, playwriting or design in the areas of set, sound, or make-up.

## **ATTENDANCE REQUIREMENTS:**

# The expected learning outcomes for the course will be assessed through:

- **Discussion Board.** Discussions in response to readings and PowerPoint slides we will cover all week long. Students will be graded on their participation to discuss and respond.
- **Quizzes.** Quizzes will test the student over each chapter's: key terms and concepts in theatre practice, history, and analysis covered in readings and Overview PowerPoint Slides. Questions will be multiple choice and true/false.
- Exams. Exams will test the student over the following: key terms and concepts in theatre practice, history, and analysis covered in readings and PowerPoint slides. Questions will be matching, true/false, multiple choice, and short essay. There will be two exams: a Midterm Exam and a Final Exam (not comprehensive).
