Attendance Requirements

WBUonline

Students are expected to participate in all required instructional activities in their courses. Online courses are no different in this regard; however, participation must be defined in a different manner. Student "attendance" in an online course is defined as active participation in the course as described in the course syllabus. Instructors in online courses are responsible for providing students with clear instructions for how they are required to participate in the course. Additionally, instructors are responsible for incorporating specific instructional activities within their course and will, at a minimum, have weekly mechanisms for documenting student participation. These mechanisms may include, but are not limited to, participating in a weekly discussion board, submitting/completing assignments in Blackboard, or communicating with the instructor. Students aware of necessary absences must inform the professor with as much advance notice as possible in order to make appropriate arrangements. Any student absent 25 percent or more of the online course, i.e., non-participatory during 2 or more weeks of an 8-week session, may receive an F for that course. Instructors may also file a Report of Unsatisfactory Progress for students with excessive non-participation. Any student who has not actively participated in an online class prior to the census date for any given session is considered a "no-show" and will be administratively withdrawn from the class without record. To be counted as actively participating, it is not sufficient to log in and view the course. The student must be submitting work as described in the course syllabus. Additional attendance and participation policies for each course, as defined by the instructor in the course syllabus, are considered a part of the university's attendance policy.

Course Requirements and Grading Criteria

Weekly Discussion Boards (15 points each; 120 points total)

Each student will contribute original discussion threads for each weekly assignment (varies by week) and comments on classmates' discussion threads for a total of 15 points per week based on the assigned reading. Original posts will be due by 11:59 p.m. (Central Time) on Wednesdays. Comments will be due by 11:59 p.m. (Central Time) on Sundays. Late posts will be penalized 1 point per every 24-hour period past the due date. Late comments will not be accepted.

Journal (80 points)

Each student will keep a journal that will both document his/her experience in the course and relate to materials Dr. Crowe assigns for that purpose. The journal should be updated regularly but will not be graded until the end of the term. Your journal should contain at least <u>eight</u> entries. The journal is due on **Saturday, July 23, at 11:59 p.m., Central Time**.

Essay Responses (25 points each; 75 points total)

Each student will turn in three one-essay responses based on the essays/chapters assigned during those weeks. These assignments should incorporate *Turabian* and Dr. Crowe's

Submission Guidelines. More information can be found on Blackboard. These assignments are due at 11:59 p.m., Central Time, on the following Saturdays: Essay Response #1 – Saturday, June 11; Essay Response #2 – Saturday, June 18; and Essay Response #3 – Saturday, June 25.

History Museum Analysis (75 points)

Each student will read materials Dr. Crowe will provide on Blackboard, then visit a history or history-related museum of his/her choice (with prior approval from professor) and write a 750 to 1,000-word analysis of that museum based on the information provided and using Dr. Crowe's Submission Guidelines. This critique will be turned in on **Saturday**, **July 6**, at 11:59 p.m., Central Time. A summary will be uploaded to the class discussion board by **Wednesday**, **July 9**, at 11:59 p.m., Central Time.

Memorial Analysis (75 points)

Each student will select a memorial of his/her choice within visiting distance and approve it with the professor. After visiting the site and researching its history, each student will present a 750 to 1,000-word analysis of the memorial. The analysis will include the history of the memorial, the significance of the memorial, any specific problems for the memorial, and contextualization of the memorial within the history of memorialization using materials Dr. Crowe will provide on Blackboard and incorporating Dr. Crowe's Submission Guidelines. This analysis will be turned in on **Saturday**, **July 16**, at **11:59 p.m.**, **Central Time**. A summary will be uploaded to the class discussion board by **Wednesday**, **July 13**, at **11:59 p.m.**, **Central Time**.

Digital History Analysis (750 points)

Each student will analyze a public history website (with prior approval from professor) using a rubric found on Blackboard and incorporating Dr. Crowe's Submission Guidelines. This 750 to 1,000-word analysis (accompanied by the completed rubric) will be turned in on **Saturday**, **July 2**, at 11:59 p.m., Central Time. A summary will uploaded to the class discussion board by Wednesday, June 29, at 11:59 p.m., Central Time.

Extra Credit

I offer up to 15 points of extra credit throughout the semester. This information will come to you through the Extra Credit folder on Blackboard. Extra credit assignments that are due via email MUST come from a WBU email address.
