### Animate Lab Guidance

#### **Animate Lab Tests: 9 each - 18%**

- a. There are nine Animate modules, each test consists of five questions
- b. Download the **Computer Based ZIP** file from Blackboard, then unzip the files
- c. To run the animate program, double click on the file animate.exe
- d. For each animate module test:
  - i. do screenshots to show the result of your answers to the question
  - ii. **insert each screenshot into MS Word (One for each module)**
  - iii. Upload the list of screenshots into the appropriate assignment area on Blackboard

### Case Study Guidance

#### **Case Study Assignments: 3 each - 12%**

- a. Review the individual case assignment for understanding and analysis.
- b. Prepare a paper for each assigned case.
- c. Your Case Study should have the following 5 sections: Summary, Problem Identification, Recommendations, Response to Questions, and Reflections
- d. The paper will be prepared in APA format, including a title page, the body of the case sections, and a references page.
- e. References are to be peer-reviewed. At least two peer-reviewed articles. The book may also be included as a reference but does not count toward the two required articles.

- f. Points deducted for spelling/grammar errors.
- g. Points will be awarded based on you demonstrating that you understand the case details and provide a valid analysis and recommendations.
- h. This is an individual exercise – that is – each student’s summary should be UNIQUE.

### **Discussion Posts Guidance Discussion Posts: 5 each - 20%**

1. Subjects are chosen so that they will not be able to be answered adequately in not less than 400 words and will be consistent with the APA style of writing. Failure to provide References and Citations will result in a grade of “0” for the Assignment. The decision on the adequacy of an answer is the instructor's. It is not subject to debate.
2. Assignments are graded on a 100-point scale. Assignments are due by midnight (11:59 P.M. Central Time) the first Sunday after the assignment is made. They will be considered late, after midnight of date due, and a deduction of 20 points per week will be taken.
3. Discussion Assignments will be submitted through the Discussion Forum in Blackboard. Initial Post must be submitted through the Discussion Forum. The way to do this is to create the posting in a Word Document, correcting spelling and grammar prior to copying and pasting the narrative into the Discussion Forum in Blackboard. Assignments copied and pasted or created in Blackboard will be graded as such and no consideration will be made for format changes to your documents.
4. Assignments not submitted through Blackboard, as indicated above will not be accepted.

### **Exam Guidance**

#### **Three Exams – 39%**

The exams consist of True/False and Multiple Choice questions and will cover the materials in a series of chapters. The Exams are available on Blackboard and are timed. One attempt is allowed.

- Exam # 1 covers chapters 1 through 6
- Exam # 2 covers chapters 7 through 10
- Exam # 3 covers chapters 11, 12, and 13

### **Research Paper Format and Guidance**

#### **Term Paper – 11 %**

The Research Paper will consist of not less than 7-8 pages of narrative (standard double-spaced with 1-inch margins all around) of TEXT in length (Title Pages, Tables of Content, figures, pictures, graphs, and references will not be counted as text.

A title Page is required. Table of Contents is not required). At this point, let me remind you that if you use Microsoft Word to produce your paper, its default line spacing is 1.25

inches, and you must set your line spacing accordingly to APA standards (double-line spacing, no spacing before or after). Use only 12 point Times New Roman font on your papers. This will keep paper length consistent for everyone. Since a word processor is likely to be used in preparation of the paper, it is expected that there will be NO spelling errors. I will caution you that 'Spell Check' will not catch words spelled correctly but not in the correct context. This is not an English class. However, accuracy is important. Grammar and spelling errors will be penalized at 1 point per occurrence. Clarity can affect understanding. If your work is difficult to understand, the content is questionable.

Proper credit for references used will be included and will be cited within the paper as well as in a References page. There will be at least six (6) outside **Peer Reviewed** references used (text books do not count as references). In other words, you will have to do some research to back up your conclusions.

Direct quotes should not be used. Only one or two short direct quotes will be allowed. Synthesize and paraphrase, then cite the author. Do not over cite in your term paper. Papers will be consistent with the APA style manual format. (The requirement for APA style of writing will be worth at least 20% of your grade.). See example in Blackboard.

In the Course Info/Syllabus section of Blackboard is the rubric, which is used to grade the Research Paper. Review the Term Paper Rubric so that you know what I will be looking for when I grade your Term Paper.

There is also a link to the **Wayland Library (LRC)** and one to the **Wayland Writing Center** if you need help. I am also available via email.

Any topic, which is covered in this course may be available and is subject to my approval. All research papers will be submitted into SafeAssign for plagiarism review prior to submitting for grading. Any paper with greater than 20% match will not be accepted for grading. Papers submitted in any previous course will not be accepted for credit in this course.
