## **Course Information**

### **Catalog Description:**

Conceptual dimensions and elements of the health care delivery ecosystem and important patterns of behavior and organization.

#### **Prerequisite:**

Recommended to be taken among the student's first HLAD course.

### **Course Outcome Competencies:**

- Explain the social, economic, historical factors that influenced the nature and dynamics of the evolution of the US Health System;
- Identify funding sources and their relative contributions to the health expenditure;
- Identify major gaps in access to care and reasons for those gaps;
- Compare how financing and delivery systems are interrelated, and understand how historical third-party strategies have evolved;
- Demonstrate how the roles of technology, management, and patient information systems function in the delivery of health care services.

## **Attendance Requirements**

#### **WBUonline**

Students are expected to participate in all required instructional activities in their courses. Online courses are no different in this regard; however, participation must be defined in a different manner. Student "attendance" in an online course is defined as active participation in the course as described in the course syllabus. Instructors in online courses are responsible for providing students with clear instructions for how they are required to participate in the course. Additionally, instructors are responsible for incorporating specific instructional activities within their course and will, at a minimum, have weekly mechanisms for documenting student participation. These mechanisms may include, but are not limited to, participating in a weekly discussion board, submitting/completing assignments in Blackboard, or communicating with the instructor. Students aware of necessary absences must inform the professor with as much advance notice as possible in order to make appropriate arrangements. Any student absent 25 percent or more of the online course, i.e., non-participatory during 2 or more weeks of an 8-week session, may receive an F for that course. Instructors may also file a Report of Unsatisfactory Progress for students with excessive non-participation. Any student who has not actively participated in an online class prior to the census date for any given session is considered a "no-show" and will be administratively withdrawn from the class without record. To be counted as actively participating, it is not sufficient to log in and view the course. The student must be submitting work as described in the course syllabus. Additional attendance and participation policies for each course, as defined by the instructor in the course syllabus, are considered a part of the university's attendance policy.

## **Course Requirements and Grading Criteria**

- A. *Examinations* will be made available in the course room and will be open book, and open notes. The purpose of the examinations are to test knowledge of health services topics from the perspective of a practitioner of management in the field of health administration (20 percent of final grade per examination).
- B. Participation in Current Events Discussion. Students are required to complete WEEKLY TASKS, which consist of weekly submissions of an article review and summarization pertaining to the topic of the week. In addition, you will be required to respond to a chapter question. Both submissions will also require a peer response. Responding to a chapter question already selected by another student will not receive any credit. Incorrect responses to chapter questions will also not receive any credit. Students will obtain full credit for class participation by actively participating in the class discussions and assignments. Due dates for both assignments and peer responses will be due NLT Friday, 11:59pm (CST). This will allow all to have reasonable access and time to respond accordingly (60 percent of final grade).
- C. *Grades* will be based on students' preparation and performance on assigned weekly tasks, and examinations.

A grade of "incomplete" is changed if the work required is completed prior to the last day of the next long 16-week term or 8-week session, unless the instructor designates an earlier date for completion. If the work is not completed by the appropriate date, the I is converted to an F.
