Selected issues in ancient near eastern, Jewish, or Greco-Roman backgrounds; archeology; Old Testament key subjects, critical methods, or exegesis and interpretation; or New Testament key subjects, critical methods, or exegesis and interpretation. *Note: May be repeated for credit when subject matter and topic change.*

COURSE OUTCOMES AND COMPETENCIES:

Students will -

- 1. Discern the meaning of the key of passages in the Gospel and Letters of John;
- 2. Identify major theological themes of the Gospel and Letters of John;
- 3. Demonstrate knowledge of the major historical issues related to the Gospel and Letters of John, including authorship, transmission, reception, and reliance;
- 4. Determine ways to apply the words of the Gospel and Letters of John for Christians and the church today.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS and GRADING CRITERIA:

Class Participation

Weighting: 10%

Possible Points: 100

Due to the scope of material to be covered in this course, learners are expected to attend and participate throughout the semester. Participation points are not guaranteed. To gain points, learners must engage in the instructional activities of the course.

Discussion Posts

Weighting: 14% (2% per Board)

Possible Points: 140 (20 points per Board)

Students are expected to respond to 7 discussion boards throughout the course. Each thread in the discussion board must be addressed for full credit in the assignment. These questions are reflective in nature, without a "correct" answer. They are intended to encourage thought about the readings and lectures as well as to facilitate dialogue on these topics. Sunday deadline for initial responses to instructor's threads (questions). Students should also engage in robust discussions with their classmates about posts on discussion boards. There is a minimum expectation of two substantive responses to classmates' posts per week. These interactions are due by Sunday of the week following the initial posts. All discussion posts should strive to build community and enhance the learning process.

Weekly Reading Quizzes/Reviews

Weighting: 21% (3% per Review)

The Kostenberger textbook will reinforce the lecture content for the course. Students will complete 7 weekly reading quizzes or reviews on assigned sections from the textbook. Each review must summarize and evaluate assigned readings in 1-2 pages. Turabian style is required. Students will also read John's Gospel and Letters 2 times each in 2 different translations.

Exams

Weighting: 25% (12.5% per Exam)

Students will be required to take two exams for the course. These exams will focus on material covered in the class lectures and reinforced in the required reading.

Research Paper

Weighting: 30%

Possible Points: 3000

Students will write an exegetical paper between 12-15 pages of text, excluding cover page, table of contents, appendices, and bibliography. The paper must follow the guidelines stipulated in the WBU School of Christian Studies' Style Guide. Specific details of the paper will be distributed on the first day of class.
