## **COURSE OUTCOMES AND COMPETENCIES:**

Students will –

1. Demonstrate knowledge of the general rules of Biblical interpretation leading to a proclamation of the Biblical text that is both responsible and defensible
2. Demonstrate knowledge of the history of interpretation and the effect on Biblical interpretation
3. Demonstrate knowledge of genres of the biblical text, tools used in interpretation, and scholarly criticism necessary for responsible exegesis of the Biblical text.

## **COURSE REQUIREMENTS and GRADING CRITERIA:**

### Class Attendance/Participation

**Weighting: 80%**

**Possible Points: 80**

Due to the scope of material to be covered in this course, learners are expected to attend and participate throughout the semester. Participation points are not guaranteed. To gain points, learners must engage in the instructional activities of the course. Since facilitating the learning experience is partially dependent on peer interaction, absence from activities will result in the loss of participation points. *It is important to note that not all assignments are weighted equally with regard to possible participation points to be gained.*

### Discussion Posts

**Weighting: 16% (4% per Discussion Board)**

**Possible Points: 160 (40 points per Board)**

Students are expected to engage 4 discussion boards throughout the course. The discussion questions are reflective in nature, without a “correct” answer. Sunday deadline for initial responses to instructor’s threads (questions). ***There is an expectation of two substantive responses to classmates’ posts per week.*** These interactions are due by week’s end following the week of initial posts.

### Weekly Reading Quizzes/Reviews

**Weighting: 21% (3% per Review)**

**Possible Points: 210 (30 points per Review)**

The Köstenberger text will reinforce the lecture content for the course. Students are required to complete 7 weekly reading quizzes or reviews on assigned chapters from the textbook. Each review must summarize and evaluate assigned readings in 1-2 pages. Turabian style is required.

### Research Paper

**Weighting: 25%**

**Possible Points: 250**

Students will write an hermeneutics paper between 8-10 pages of text, excluding cover page, table of contents, appendices, and bibliography. The paper must follow the guidelines stipulated in the WBU School of Christian Studies’ Style Guide. Specific details of the paper will be distributed on the first day of class.

### Exams

**Weighting: 30% (15% per Exam)**

**Possible Points: 300 (150 points per Exam)**

Students will be required to take two exams. These exams will focus on material covered in the class lectures and reinforced in the required reading. The exams will divide the lectures in half and are not comprehensive.
