- Two exams **The midterm** exam covers materials from weeks 1-5 and **the Final Exam** covers weeks 6-10. The exams may consist of a set of objective questions taken on Blackboard that cover all readings, class notes and videos provided for class content. There may also be up to 3 essay questions on each exam. **You may use class notes and the Study Bible Only**. Midterm covers Intro through Joshua.
