TESTOUT:

The TestOut curriculum offers a variety of training and evaluation scenarios, demonstrations, and practical objectives through simulations. The number of training and evaluations vary from one chapter to the next. The grade acquired is based upon the success in completing the required training and evaluation per chapter. The total percentage possible for the interactions in TestOut constitutes 64% of the course work. Therefore, it is imperative that each student remains engaged throughout the semester to obtain the knowledge demanded to be successful in this course.

Discussion Boards:

Discussion board participation count as your attendance grade for each week and as such, no late work will be accepted without prior consent of the instructor (this means you must obtain consent from me prior to the due date of the assignment, sending me an email the day an assignment is due does not count unless it is a medical emergency or service/work related emergency). A minimum of three discussion posts are required each week. The first or initial post is due by Wednesday of each week. Follow-up postings to at least two of your classmates are required to be submitted by the end of the week. Three posts are required for credit. All three posts must be turned in on time for credit. Substantial and meaningful posting are required for each post. (150 – 200 words)
