Catalog Description:

Review and analysis of applicable state and federal regulations pertaining to licensure, accreditation, standards of Federal participation, conditions for State operation in nursing homes, continuing care retirement centers, hospice programs, extended care facilities and related long-term care institutions.

Course Outcome Competencies:

- Explain the intent and purpose of rules and regulations in long-term care and the nursing facility regulatory and survey process.
- Examine the agencies responsible for the development and enforcement of rules and regulations relevant to long-term care.
- Analyze current legal and regulatory requirements related to clinical care and the resident assessment instrument.
- Assess the processes for determining resident rights, resident abuse, and resident neglect.

Attendance Requirements

WBUonline

Students are expected to participate in all required instructional activities in their courses. Online courses are no different in this regard; however, participation must be defined in a different manner. Student "attendance" in an online course is defined as active participation in the course as described in the course syllabus. Instructors in online courses are responsible for providing students with clear instructions for how they are required to participate in the course. Additionally, instructors are responsible for incorporating specific instructional activities within their course and will, at a minimum, have weekly mechanisms for documenting student participation. These mechanisms may include, but are not limited to, participating in a weekly discussion board, submitting/completing assignments in Blackboard, or communicating with the instructor. Students aware of necessary absences must inform the professor with as much advance notice as possible in order to make appropriate arrangements. Any student absent 25 percent or more of the online course, i.e., non-participatory during 2 or more weeks of an 8-week session, may receive an F for that course. Instructors may also file a Report of Unsatisfactory Progress for students with excessive non-participation. Any student who has not actively participated in an online class prior to the census date for any given session is considered a "no-show" and will be administratively withdrawn from the class without record. To be counted as actively participating, it is not sufficient to log in and view the course. The student must be submitting work as described in the course syllabus. Additional attendance and participation policies for each course, as defined by the instructor in the course syllabus, are considered a part of the university's attendance policy.

Student Grade Appeals: Students shall have protection through orderly procedures against prejudices or capricious academic evaluation. A student who believes that he or she has not been held to realistic academic standards, just evaluation procedures, or appropriate grading, may appeal the <u>final</u> grade given in the course by using the student grade appeal process described in the Academic Catalog. Appeals may not be made for advanced placement examinations or course bypass examinations. Appeals are limited to the final course grade, which may be upheld, raised, or lowered at any stage of the appeal process. Any recommendation to lower a course grade must be submitted through the Vice President of Academic Affairs to the Faculty Assembly Grade Appeals Committee for review and approval. The Faculty Assembly Grade Appeals Committee may instruct that the course grade be upheld, raised, or lowered to a more proper evaluation.

Course Requirements and Grading Criteria

Discussion Board Forum: The weekly discussion board assignments will have a deadline of Wednesday and Sunday due by 1159 p.m. CST of the assigned weeks. This class requires active class participation. **You must make <u>substantive</u> contributions** to the threaded discussion each week. Respond to some or all the starter questions and additional responses from your classmates to make at least 2 posts each discussion assignment. You can either support or refute the observations or hypothesis presented.

Exams: A mid-term exam will be given the 4th week of class and the final exam given on the last week of this course. These examinations will be unique for this course and in essay form.

Research Paper: An in-depth term paper project must also be developed on an approved topic encompassing extensive library and Internet research. Topics for papers must be pre-approved by the professor. **All papers must be written using the APA style.** The paper should be a minimum of seven pages of content, excluding cover sheet, abstract and references, and should utilize at least ten scholarly references. A simple compilation of the authoritative works on a subject will be necessary but insufficient to properly complete the project. A thorough analysis of the subject must be made with conclusions developed by the student. This paper is due no later than the seventh week of the scheduled term and will be worth 20% of the student's final grade. The paper will be submitted via SafeAssignment and via e-mail.

Paper 20%
Midterm 10%
Final 10%

Other Important Information:

Assignments are due on the deadlines given when the assignment is posted.

- 2. No assignments will be accepted after due date.
- 3. Written work, including the term paper, is graded based on content first, but also on the quality of grammar and punctuation.
- 4. All written assignments should be 12-point type, double-spaced, and using APA Manuscript Writing Style.
- 5. Questions concerning grades received should be resolved within one week after the assignment has been returned.
- 6. Unless noted as a group assignment, all work should be original work of the individual student.
- 7. Academic honesty is expected of all students. Plagiarism, cheating, and other acts that lack academic honesty may result in a zero on the assignment.
- 8. Students will need to use the Internet to access some assignments.
- 9. Always contact the professor if you need assistance.

The University has a standard grade scale:

A = 90-100, B = 80-89, C = 70-79, D = 60-69, F= below 60, W = Withdrawal, WP = withdrew passing, WF = withdrew failing, I = incomplete. An incomplete may be given within the last two weeks of a long term, within the last week of an 8-week session, or within the last two days of a microterm to a student who is passing, but has not completed a term paper, examination, or other required work for reasons beyond the student's control. A grade of "incomplete" is changed if the work required is completed prior to the last day of the next long 16-week term or 8-week session, unless the instructor designates an earlier date for completion. If the work is not completed by the appropriate date, the I is converted to an F.
