Course Information

Catalog Description: Major religious, political, economic, and social development in the world from ancient times through the Middle Ages.

There is no prerequisite for this course.

Course Outcome Competencies: Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

- Locate major features of the geography of the ancient Near East, Asia, Africa, and Europe
- Describe the growth and development of the earliest civilizations of Mesopotamia, Egypt,
 China, Africa, and Meso-America
- Explain the emergence of major world religions and philosophies including Judaism, Buddhism, Islam, Confucianism, Taoism, and Christianity
- Trace the development and historical events of Ancient and Classical Greece and Rome
- Define Feudalism and describe the historic events of the Middle Ages

Attendance Requirements

WBUonline

Students are expected to participate in all required instructional activities in their courses. Online courses are no different in this regard; however, participation must be defined in a different manner. Student "attendance" in an online course is defined as active participation in the course as described in the course syllabus. Instructors in online courses are responsible for providing students with clear instructions for how they are required to participate in the course. Additionally, instructors are responsible for incorporating specific instructional activities within their course and will, at a minimum, have weekly mechanisms for documenting student participation. These mechanisms may include, but are not limited to, participating in a weekly discussion board, submitting/completing assignments in Blackboard, or communicating with the instructor. Students aware of necessary absences must inform the professor with as much advance notice as possible in order to make appropriate arrangements. Any student absent 25 percent or more of the online course, i.e., non-participatory during 2 or more weeks of an 8-week session, may receive an F for that course. Instructors may also file a Report of Unsatisfactory Progress for students with excessive non-participation. Any student who has not actively participated in an online class prior to the census date for any given session is considered a "no-show" and will be administratively withdrawn from the class without record. To be counted as actively participating, it is not sufficient to log in and view the course. The student must be submitting work as described in the course syllabus. Additional attendance and participation policies for each course, as defined by the instructor in the course syllabus, are considered a part of the university's attendance policy.

Course Requirements and Grading Criteria

<u>Module Exams</u>: There will be 8 Module Exams based on the assigned chapter readings in each Module. Each Module Exam will consist of 20 multiple-choice questions (worth .4 points each, for a total of 8 points). Each Module Exam will be timed and may be attempted <u>once</u>.

<u>Discussion Boards:</u> There will be 4 Discussion Boards to correspond with the broader themes discussed in the text. Students will need to post an initial response and then at least 2 student responses.

<u>Practice Tests:</u> Practices tests for each chapter will be available to students as an additional study tool. Each practice test may be taken <u>twice</u>, but will not be graded for credit.

Extra Credit: Students may earn up to 2 extra credit points by completing the "Required First Assignment" in our Blackboard class page by the end of the first week of class.

The University has a standard grade scale:

A grade of "incomplete" is changed if the work required is completed prior to the last day of the next long 16-week term or 8-week session, unless the instructor designates an earlier date for completion. If the work is not completed by the appropriate date, the I is converted to an F.
