## Course Information

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**Catalog Description:** European background, exploration and discovery, colonization, the War of Independence, the Constitution, early national period, Jefferson and Jackson, expansion, and the era of sectionalism culminating in the Civil War and Reconstruction.

**There is no prerequisite for this course.**

**Course Outcome Competencies:** Upon completion of this course, students will be able to understand and describe:

- Causes, process, and results of the exploration and settlement of the American colonies
- Causes, course, and results of the American revolutionary period
- Political, social, and economic events of the early national period
- Political, social, and economic transformation during the Jacksonian era
- Causes, course, and results of slavery and the era of sectional conflict
- Events and significant persons in the lives of ethnic minority and female Americans
- Causes, course, and results of the Civil War
- Political and social ramifications of Southern Reconstruction

## Attendance Requirements

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### WBUonline

Students are expected to participate in all required instructional activities in their courses. Online courses are no different in this regard; however, participation must be defined in a different manner. Student “attendance” in an online course is defined as active participation in the course as described in the course syllabus. Instructors in online courses are responsible for providing students with clear instructions for how they are required to participate in the course. Additionally, instructors are responsible for incorporating specific instructional activities within their course and will, at a minimum, have weekly mechanisms for documenting student participation. These mechanisms may include, but are not limited to, participating in a weekly discussion board, submitting/completing assignments in Blackboard, or communicating with the instructor. Students aware of necessary absences must inform the professor with as much advance notice as possible in order to make appropriate arrangements. Any student absent 25 percent or more of the online course, i.e., non-participatory during 2 or more weeks of an 8-week session, may receive an F for that course. Instructors may also file a Report of Unsatisfactory Progress for students with excessive non-participation. Any student who has not actively participated in an online class prior to the census date for any given session is considered a “no-show” and will be administratively withdrawn from the class without record. To be counted as actively participating, it is not sufficient to log in and view the course. The student must be submitting work as described in the course syllabus. Additional attendance and participation policies for each course, as defined by the instructor in the course syllabus, are considered a part of the university’s attendance policy.

## Course Requirements and Grading Criteria

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**Module Exams:** There will be 8 Module Exams based on the assigned chapter readings in each Module. Each Module Exam will consist of 20 multiple-choice questions (worth .5 points each, for a total of 10 points). Each Module Exam will be timed and may be attempted once.

**Discussion Boards/Journals:** There will be 6 Discussion Boards/Journals, worth up to 15 points each, to correspond with the broader themes discussed in the text. There will also be one Introduction DB, worth up to 5 points. Students will need to post an initial response and then at least 2 student responses for each Discussion Board. Additional instructions will be posted for each DB.

**Practice Tests:** Practice tests for each chapter will be available to students as an additional study tool. Each practice test may be taken twice but will not be graded for credit.

**Extra Credit:** Students may earn up to 2 extra credit points by completing the “Required First Assignment” in our Blackboard class page by the end of the first week of class.

**Book/Movie Review:** Students will complete one Book/Movie Review (worth up to 25 possible points). Additional instructions in Blackboard. Due no later than 11:59pm on Saturday, July 22, 2023.

**The University has a standard grade scale:**

If the work is not completed by the appropriate date, the I is converted to an F.
