Course Information

Catalog Description:

Ethical challenges facing today's technologically rich health care environment. Tools for understanding and effectively dealing with bioethical encounters. Topics include gametes, embryos, surrogacy, abortion, and new reproductive technology, human cloning, competency, self-determination, autonomy, access; the ethical considerations of physician assisted death, withdrawn fluids and nutrition management, family characteristics, ethical elements of managed care, emergency care, rationing decisions, and an examination of future bioethical challenges.

Course Outcome Competencies:

- Interpret the major areas of ethical philosophy.
- Explain the effects of ethical and unethical actions upon the health care consumer.
- Apply confidentiality as it relates to ethics and responsibility for protecting the integrity of the medical record.
- Explain workplace laws as they relate to ethical practice.
- Compare ethical options as they relate to death and dying in the health care environment.

Attendance Requirements

WBUonline

Students are expected to participate in all required instructional activities in their courses. Online courses are no different in this regard; however, participation must be defined in a different manner. Student "attendance" in an online course is defined as active participation in the course as described in the course syllabus. Instructors in online courses are responsible for providing students with clear instructions for how they are required to participate in the course. Additionally, instructors are responsible for incorporating specific instructional activities within their course and will, at a minimum, have weekly mechanisms for documenting student participation. These mechanisms may include, but are not limited to, participating in a weekly discussion board, submitting/completing assignments in Blackboard, or communicating with the instructor. Students aware of necessary absences must inform the professor with as much advance notice as possible in order to make appropriate arrangements. Any student absent 25 percent or more of the online course, i.e., non-participatory during 2 or more weeks of an 8-week session, may receive an F for that course. Instructors may also file a Report of Unsatisfactory Progress for students with excessive non-participation. Any student who has not actively participated in an online class prior to the census date for any given session is considered a "no-show" and will be administratively withdrawn from the class without record. To be counted as actively participating, it is not sufficient to log in and view the course. The student must be submitting work as described in the course syllabus. Additional attendance and participation policies for each course, as defined by the instructor in the course syllabus, are considered a part of the university's attendance policy.

Student Grade Appeals: Students shall have protection through orderly procedures against prejudices or capricious academic evaluation. Appeals may not be made for advanced placement examinations or course bypass examinations. Appeals are limited to the final course grade, which may be upheld, raised, or lowered at any stage of the appeal process. The Faculty Assembly Grade Appeals Committee may instruct that the course grade be upheld, raised, or lowered to a more proper evaluation.

Course Requirements and Grading Criteria

- 1. <u>Weekly Discussion Posts:</u> You will be required to participate in the discussion board forum using Blackboard as assigned in accordance with the syllabus. Discussion question responses are required to be posted no later than 10 p.m. (Central Standard Time (CST)) on Wednesday of the assigned week. Additionally, students are required to respond to one classmate to engage and influence forward thinking through class involvement in the discussion board.
 - a. <u>Initial Discussion Posts:</u> These posts must be a minimum of 5-7 sentences in length. You must use textual evidence to support your response.
 - b. Response to Peers: These posts must be a minimum of 3-5 sentences to receive credit.
- 2. Weekly Quizzes: Quizzes will be assigned weekly. Questions will come from the text according to required reading each week. Students will be required to complete quizzes by no later than midnight (CST) on Sunday of the assigned week. There will be NO Makeups for the weekly quizzes. Quizzes and exams can be found in the Course Content tab within the associated session number that corresponds to the week in which the topics are covered. The quizzes will close on the deadline. Students will have 60 minutes to complete each quiz. Ensure that you adhere to all quiz deadlines.
- **Exams:** There will be two exams, a mid-term and a final covering the course material. Quizzes and exams can be found in the Course Content tab within the associated session number that corresponds to the week in which the topics are covered. The exams will close on the deadline. Students will have 60 minutes to complete each exam. Ensure that you adhere to exam deadlines.

An incomplete may be given within the last two weeks of a long term, within the last week of an 8-week session, or within the last two days of a microterm to a student who is passing, but has not completed a term paper, examination, or other required work for reasons beyond the student's control. A grade of "incomplete" is changed if the work required is completed prior to the last day of the next long 16-week term or 8-week session, unless the instructor designates an earlier date for completion. If the work is not completed by the appropriate date, the I is converted to an F.
